Necessary steps like academic review in respective departmental meetings and recruitment of qualified Guest Teachers can be mentioned as direct consequence of the analysis. The second major component of the online feedback form is infrastructural support and the analysis of the students' input has recommended renewal of NLIST for providing e-learning facilities, continuous up-gradation of Virtual and Smart Classroom facilities, improvement of Canteen facilities, and inclusion of indoor sports like chess, table tennis, gymnasium.
